



- Agreeing "You're right. He's so arrogant!"
- Disagreeing "I don't think he's arrogant. He's just under pressure."
- Philosophizing "She's now in a better place."
- Analyzing "Do you think you might be jealous?"
- Sympathy "I know how you feel. I lost a sister, too."
- Minimizing "At least you didn't get hurt in the accident."
- "Awfulizing" "Oh, dear, that's terrible!"
- Story Telling "This reminds me of a time when..."
- One Upping "Wait till you hear what happened to me!"
- Stealing the Lime Light "Yes. I'm going through the same. Last week..."
- Judging "You shouldn't have done that."
- Shutting Down or Reassuring "Don't worry. Get a good night's sleep."
- * Explaining "I wasn't feeling well. That's why I didn't make it."

Validation and Hope	Toxic Positivity
This is hard. You've done hard things before and I believe in you.	You'll get over it!
I know there is a lot that could go wrong. What could go right?	Just be positive!
All feelings are welcome here. This is an emotional time for all of us.	Don't bring others down with your sad feelings.
It's normal to feel some negativity in this situation. Change is difficult.	Stop being so negative!
It's probably hard to be positive right now. I am praying for you and for all of us.	Just think happy thoughts.

Empathy and Barriers to Empathy

Validation and Hope	Toxic Positivity
It's never fun to feel like that. Is there something we can do that might make this easier for you?	It's up to you to make yourself happy.
It may be hard to see any good in this situation. This is a process. We need to give it time.	See the good in everything.
Sometimes giving up or walking away seems like the only option. Take a break. Give yourself some time. See how you feel later.	Never give up!

Targeted Restructuring Process





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From Bishop Hicks

- When I was installed as the bishop of the Diocese of Joliet two years ago, I was immediately inundated with statistics of too few pastors to cover too many parishes, especially as we project the numbers into the near future. I was also confronted with declining Mass attendance and budgetary issues, all exacerbated by the pandemic.
- Why, then, am I leading us into this targeted restructuring? It is because most of us want to see a Church that is focused on the mission of Jesus Christ and not on the preservation of our buildings. As missionary disciples, we should all desire a Church that is thriving, growing and following the Gospel. In other words, everything we do as a Church needs to be about the salvation of souls.

From Bishop Hicks, continued

- The phases of the restructuring are 1) Urgent; 2) in the next year; and 3) in two to three years.
- Once specific parishes and schools are informed they will be engaged in targeted restructuring, they will begin a process of preparation, assessment and discernment before final decisions are made or changes implemented. Please know we are committed to actively listening to the voices of the pastors, principals, parishioners, parish employees and volunteers.
- At the end of the day, I do not want us to be viewed as a diocese that buried its head in the sand or kicked the can down the road. Instead, with deep faith in God, we need to prune some of the structural branches, so that our Church can continue to produce great fruit.

The Mission of the Church

Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age. (Matt 28:19-20)



The Church's Mission is to Evangelize

To fulfill this mission, we need:

- 1. Holy, healthy and happy priests
- 2. Competent and committed pastoral and administrative staff
- 3. Lay people who are empowered and equipped to share the Good News
- 4. People of God actively worshiping, partaking of the sacraments, and participating in the life of their parish.



Targeted Restructuring Support Process: Desired Outcome

- To facilitate a process whereby the details of the Targeted Restructuring Process are shared with the people of the Joliet Diocese in a reflective, prayer-based and honorable way.
- To solicit and pass on feedback from the people of God to the Targeted Restructuring Committee.

Parish roles within restructuring

- Primary: these are parishes whose potential scenarios may include merging with other parishes to form a new parish, amalgamation of several parishes into one, or creation of a mission or chapel.
- Support: these are parishes that are geographically close to a primary parish and because they are serving neighboring or even overlapping communities, are in the position to offer spiritual and other support to the people of the primary parishes.



Roles: Pastors and Key Parish Leaders

1. Publicize and support the targeted restructuring process in your interactions so that as many people as possible can receive the invitation to participate in the process at your parish;


2. Participate in training sessions and key leader sessions;

3. Work with CLI Leadership Consultants to offer two (2) consultation sessions at the parish in order to inform parishioners about the planning initiative and engage them in providing feedback on future models of parish life;

4. Work with CLI Leadership Consultants to finalize draft scenarios for parishioner feedback, summarize feedback from the parish sessions, and prioritize scenarios, and/or discuss new alternatives that have emerged; and

5. Work with the CLI Leadership Consultants to draft recommendations for the Targeted Restructuring Committee based on feedback from parishioners.

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
Key data considerations of the Restructuring Committee

Multiple factors including but not limited to

- Data points on priests and seminarians
 - Sacramental numbers
 - Mass counts
- Average number of seats occupied at weekend masses
 - Demographic data and trends
 - Parish finances
 - Parish facilities' assessments.



The people shortage is greater than the priest shortage



- Catholic marriages are down 55% since 1990
- 1 in 5 children baptized do not receive 1st Holy Communion.
- 2 in 5 children baptized do not receive Confirmation.
- 85% of children confirmed stop practicing their faith by


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









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Former Catholics Up

% of Population Under Age 30



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

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
Sacraments in the Diocese (reported for 1990-2024)

PRIESTS AND SEMINARIANS-2024 DATA

Current Data

- Total number of diocesan priests: 155
- Total number of active diocesan priests ages 65-69: 14
- Total number of active diocesan priests ages 70+: 7
- Since 2021, **18** diocesan priests have died.
- There are currently **27** men in seminary formation.
 - Expecting 2 ordinations in 2025; perhaps 4-5 in 2026.

<u>Trends</u>

- Between 2022 and 2024 we experienced a loss of 12.4% in the number of active diocesan priests (22 priests)
- 24% fewer active diocesan priests today than in 1970
- 66.3% fewer order priests today than in 1970

Parish Mass Attendance Data (Refer to Handout)

The range of weekend Mass attendance (registered parishioners/Mass count) is from

79.30 % to 9.40 %

The average percentage attendance is 27.4%.



Range of Experiences in Phase 3 Parishes

- Number of Parishioners in your parishes range from 238 to 3002
- Number of Weekend mass attendees range from 65 to 760


